














ECONOMIC JUSTICE




WHY LEAD?

Ohio ranked second nationally for elevated blood lead level (BLL) rates among children in a recent study in JAMA Pediatrics.

Toledo, Ohio's fourth largest city, has all zip codes designated as high risk for childhood lead poisoning by the Ohio Department of Health.

The Junction Neighborhood has 88% percent pre- 1980 housing compared to the US 52%, including 51% pre-1940 housing compared to the US 12%. Our community has 67% of children below the Federal Poverty Limit.


















Get The Lead Out Of The Holidays

Our partner, Neighborhood Health Association, not only provided their new and spacious Nexus Healthcare Facility, but also 3 Nurses who conducted Free Lead Screening for the children in attendance. 53 Children were screened, with another 37 appointments made due to time constrains and overwhelming interest. The Junction Coalition and the Lead Detective provided parents valuable and culturally competent information to keep their families safe. Other partners, Including The Library and University of Toledo donated toys, books, And gifts For giveaway. The coalition provided grocery gift cards as another incentive!



Sock Hop Screening Event




Multiple Partners From The Toledo Lead Poisoning
Prevention Coalition, Fair Housing Center, Toledo Lucas
County Health Department, University of Toledo Medical
Center, And Wayman Palmer YMCA helped get 11 children
screened at this event. We had family friendly activities,
plenty of food for everyone, and culturally competent
lead education as well!



Unfortunately, 64% of the screened children showed elevated levels of lead in their blood. This activated The Toledo Lucas County Health Department's Lead Team To get veinous testing and home visits scheduled.



- Recommended well-child visits occur at 12 mo, 15 mo, 18 mo of age
